An audit of volunteering opportunities at Council has been completed and training provided by staff for Volunteers in Seniors Centre and Bush care. Targets set for volunteers numbers.

Youth Department has moved the Youth Tree of Hope (artwork) around various Council public spaces for public to view.

It was noted disability is not only physical and mobility challenges extends to include those with communication challenges. Language in our DIAP should address all forms of disability.

Susan raised a query on page 16, wording 'reasonable adjustment', Anne confirmed this is NDIS language, therefore our report is in line with NDIS language.

July 2022 welcomed new members to this committee, to meet every few months and to discuss concerns, issued raised, to investigate, action and measure Council's accountability.

### 7. DISABILITY INCLUSION IN SPORT EVENT 2023

Council is seeking support and suggestions from the committee and local sporting and community groups to assist and/or be involved in a community all-inclusive Sporting Event in 2023.

The event is in early stages of planning, group discussion identified some community groups to approach for information and involvement, such as Office of Sport, Special Olympics Cerebral Palsy group, Spit Sailability and Council to attend the sporting group's bi-annual meeting.

Andrew confirmed this is a one off sporting event not a program, and requested champions for this event for assistance.

#### 8. MOSPLAN INCLUSION PROJECTS PRESENTATION

#### a) Youth Wellbeing Initiative (Matthew Wyatt)

A Special Projects program was presented to Council in 2022 for a Youth Mental Health Program.

Every 3 years Mosman Youth conducts a survey open to 12-25 years, results identified in Mosman mental health being the highest concern. A report with results and facts distributed to the committee and a report relating to social isolation (My Voice poster attached below).

Mosman Youth granted funding four years of \$20,000 per year. To facilitate after school and school holidays events, activities and workshops such as creative art activities, Aboriginal art, and a M.A.D (Music, Art & Dance) Therapy activities.

Youth plan to upskill and train community in suicide awareness, targeting year 11 and 12 students as youth champions also providing Mental Health First Aid courses. Mapping of these initiatives also to include sports mentors and pastors, training leaders to respond accurately.

School academic stress was highlighted, youth encouraged to attend the Youth Centre to complete homework and opportunity to discuss mental health concerns. Phoenix House, local run group, and

Plans for speaker nights for parents giving information on local services available to assist with mental health. Promotion for Youth Centre is via Mosman Youth Services website. Council Events website, Mosman Daily, socials such as Instagram and Facebook posts, Council's Roundup and youth internal newsletter. It was noted new Student Support Officer roles have been rolled out in high schools and the support Officer at Mosman High, Hayley Rose, is a great link for Council and Youth Services into the School. Discussion to re-establish and facilitate the Principal liaison group meetings, ceased due to Covid. Youth Consultation Report 2020-2021 is available on Council website. b) Dementia Awareness and Education Project (Maya Jankovic) Community Care awarded two years funding \$10,000 for two years for projects, events, training and workshops. Recent data identified 30% of the community are affected by dementia and memory loss. Council will provide training for staff, volunteers, families and carers. Aim to complete by 2022, reflective session early 2023 followed by a survey in 2023. Plans to deliver training to 50 volunteers and staff, encouraging Champions. Deliver community workshop/s to external participants and planning is underway for more training in 2023-2024. A review of care plans now asks questions around memory loss to establish earlier signs by noting changes and record the responses. Mosman Council is Working with Dementia Australia, for suggestions and improvements to our Council spaces. Looking at other Councils for ideas. Cr Friedrich – raised concern common theme of challenges between mental health, disability and dementia, what could address embracing, love to value difference. Discussion on how can the community normalise challenges of disability groups. **GENERAL BUSINESS**
